Can I Change My Mind?

- We are available throughout your pregnancy to assist you in making the right decision
- No legal paperwork will be signed until after the birth
- You are the one who decides if your baby is adopted and which family will adopt them
- In Pennsylvania, birth parents must wait at least 72 hours, after birth, before they can sign a consent to adopt, which is followed by a 30 day period during which they can change their mind.

What Supports Are There For Me?

- If you choose to parent, we will connect you with the community resources needed
- If you choose adoption, we will assist you in selecting a family that will provide a permanent, loving, and stable home

What Contact Will I Have with the Family and My Baby?

The amount of contact between the birth family and the adoptive family depends on what you both find comfortable. There are two options – a closed adoption and an open adoption.

- A "closed adoption" refers to a placement where little to no confidential information is shared.
- An "open adoption" is broader. It means the birth family meets with the adoptive parents before the birth. After birth, they sometimes send texts, letters, and photos, or they even make scheduled visits.
